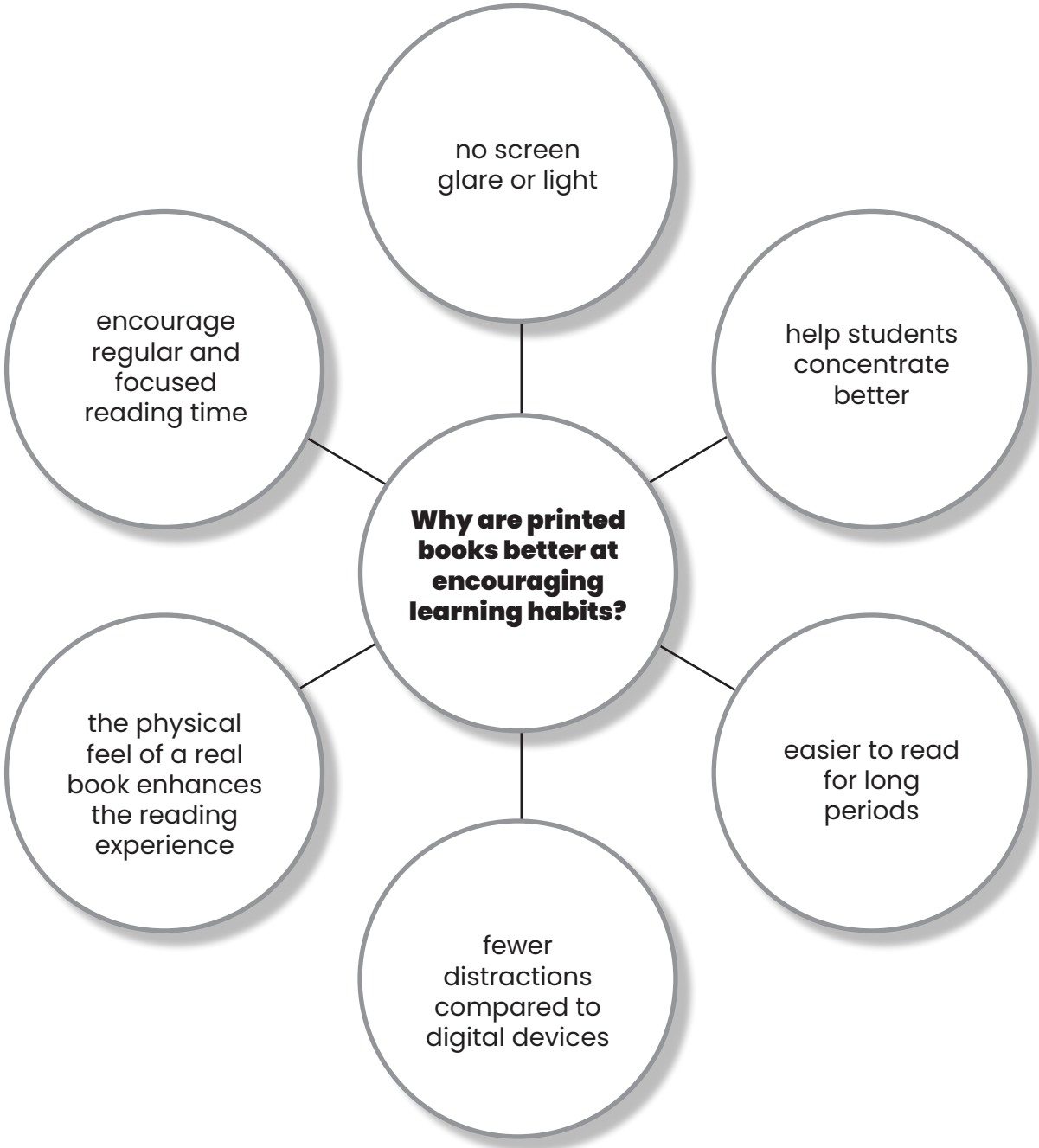

Mark Cuba: Credit Cards

Mark Cuba makes headlines with his bold statement, “If you use credit cards, you don’t want to be rich.” He shares his (21) _____ opinions on credit cards, emphasising their negative impact on financial health. He explains that using credit cards allows their (22) _____ to profit from high interest rates and fees, effectively sabotaging one’s ability to build (23) _____. For him, credit cards are a financial trap that encourages overspending and unnecessary debt.

When asked if he dislikes credit cards, Mark admits he (24) _____ them, describing how they tempt people into living beyond their means. Reflecting on his own experience, he warns against the dangers of credit card debt, which can escalate (25) _____ if balances are not paid in full each month.

While (26) _____ finance experts argue that credit cards offer benefits such as rewards and help build credit scores, Mark contends that these advantages are outweighed by the risks. He suggests focusing on alternatives, such as using debit cards to spend within your (27) _____ and building an emergency fund for unexpected expenses.

For those already in debt, Mark advises stopping credit card use immediately and prioritising repayments, (28) _____ with the card that has the highest interest. He stresses the importance of staying out of (29) _____ once it has been cleared. Mark’s key message is that credit cards are not your ally; instead, he encourages people to spend wisely, save and invest in their future for (30) _____ financial freedom.

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
